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

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
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

2022 NEW MEXICO BOWL

The 17th Annual New Mexico Bowl will kick-off from University Stadium in Albuquerque with one of its most anticipated matchups in history.

BYU (7-5, Independent) will be making its second appearance in the New Mexico Bowl when it takes on SMU (7-5, 5-3 American Athletic Conference).

The Cougars won the 2010 New Mexico Bowl against UTEP, earning a 52-24 victory over the Miners led by New Mexico Bowl MVP Jake Heaps' four passing touchdowns, including three to wideout Cody Hoffman.

BYU's offense ranks No. 32 nationally at 440.7 yards per game and averaged 31.9 points per game. The Cougars picked up Power 5 wins over Baylor and Stanford and a victory over regional rival Boise State while playing a strong overall schedule. Including its upcoming matchup with SMU, 10 of BYU's 12 FBS opponents in 2022 earned bowl eligibility with six or more wins.

This year will be BYU's 40th bowl overall dating back to the 1974 Fiesta Bowl. Among their 40 bowl appearances, the Cougars have played in 20 different bowl games in 12 states. BYU's 40 bowl invitations rank tied for No. 20 among college programs—more than storied programs such as UCLA, Notre Dame, Oregon, lowa and Wisconsin. The Cougars have gone bowling in 17 of the past 18 seasons.

This year's game will be the second time the Cougars and Mustangs have met in a bowl game. The first overall matchup between the two schools took place in San Diego at the 1980 Holiday Bowl, known by Cougar fans as the "Miracle Bowl."

In 1980's historic game, BYU completed one of the greatest comebacks in college football history by scoring 21 points over the final 2:33 of the game to beat the Mustangs 46-45.

SMU has won four of its last five games with a 7-5 record overall and boast the nation's 11th best scoring offense, putting up 38.4 points per game. The Mustangs are coached by Rhett Lashlee. The former Miami (2020-21) and SMU (2018-19) offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach has the Mustangs galloping to the No. 12 offense overall in the FBS, averaging 479.8 yards per game, highlighted by the No. 5 passing attack at 324.9 yards per game.

SMU features the nation's leading receiver in Rashee Rice who is No. 1 in receiving yards per game at 112.9 and No. 2 overall receiving yards with 1,355. Mustang quarterback Tanner Mordecai is also among the nation's best passers with 300.5 passing yards per game, which ranks No. 10 nationally. As a team, SMU finished the regular season in the top 15 among FBS rankings for passing offense (5th, 324.9), scoring offense (11th, 38.4), total offense (12th, 279.8), first down offense (12th, 302), red zone offense (13th, .914), blocked kicks (8th, 4) and fewest penalties per game (10th, 4.42).

Appearing in the New Mexico Bowl for the first time, the Mustangs have been selected to play in a bowl game four years in a row for just the second time in program history. The Mustangs have earned a bowl bid in six of the last seven years but missed out on their 2020 and 2021 games due to Covid-19 cancellations. SMU began playing football in 1915 and has been invited to 18 bowl games overall.

AMERICAN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

The American Athletic Conference consists of 12 prestigious institutions: the University of Central Florida, the University of Cincinnati, East Carolina University, the University of Houston, the University of Memphis, the U.S. Naval Academy (in football only), the University of South Florida Southern Methodist University, Temple University, Tulane University, the University of Tulsa, and Wichita State University (in basketball and Olympic sports).

Under the leadership of commissioner Mike Aresco, the American Athletic Conference has fashioned an impressive list of accomplishments in the competitive arena, in the classroom and in support of student-athlete welfare. The American is firmly established as a Power 6 conference thanks to its collection of national team and individual championships, football and basketball postseason victories, expansive media rights contract with ESPN, and its commitment to providing the highest levels of support for student-athletes.

The league has produced four NCAA championship teams in addition to a College Football Playoff semifinalist, three New Year's Six bowl champions (UCF in 2013 and 2017; Houston in 2015), two NCAA Men's Final Four participants, six Women's Final Four teams, an NIT champion, 13 NCAA individual championships, and a Rhodes Scholar. Additionally, American Athletic Conference teams have advanced to the College World Series, qualified for the match play round of the NCAA Men's Golf Championship and registered multiple top-10 finishes at the NCAA Cross Country and Outdoor Track and Field championships.

The American has seen a member school claim a spot in a New Year's Six bowl seven times in the league's first nine football seasons, including the 2021 campaign, when Cincinnati became the first American Athletic Conference team to reach the College Football Playoff. The American was the only conference to have a team in the College Football Playoff and the NCAA Men's Final Four in the 2021 calendar year.

Individual teams in The American have enjoyed some of their best football seasons in program history as members of the conference. Cincinnati has registered back-to-back top-10 finishes after the Bearcats were No. 4 in 2021 after their historic CFP appearance and No. 8 in the final 2020 national polls. UCF finished in the national top 10 twice as a conference member – in 2013 and 2017. Houston went 13-1 in the 2015 football season, setting a school record for wins, while Navy won a program-record 11 games in 2015, its first season in the conference, and matched that mark with its 2019 campaign. Memphis, which had not won 10 games in a season since 1938, has registered three 10-win seasons in the last seven years (2015, 2017, 2019), including a school-record 12 wins in 2019. Temple enjoyed its first 10-win season in school history in 2015. South Florida finished in the top 25 for the first two times in program history (2016, 2017). SMU returned to national prominence in 2019 with a 10-win season, during which the Mustangs were ranked as high as No. 14 nationally. Tulsa returned to the top 25 for the first time in 11 years in 2020. East Carolina earned a top-20 ranking in 2014, while Tulane played in three consecutive bowl games for the first time in school history. Since the conference's reconstitution in 2013-14, teams from The American have registered top-10 national rankings in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, baseball, men's soccer, women's soccer, women's lacrosse, men's golf, men's tennis, women's tennis, men's cross country and men's track and field.

Under The American's banner, Houston's men's basketball team reached the 2021 NCAA Final Four and was ranked No. 3 in the final coaches' poll, while Memphis claimed the 2021 NIT title. Houston's men's track and field team took third place at the 2018 and 2019 NCAA Outdoor Championships. Tulsa has registered top-six national finishes at the 2019, 2020 and 2021 NCAA Men's Cross Country Championships.

American Athletic Conference student-athletes have distinguished themselves in all facets of intercollegiate athletics. Memphis quarterback Brady White was the 2020 winner of the National Football Foundation's James V. Campbell Trophy as the top scholar-athlete in college football. Temple linebacker Tyler Matakevich won the Bednarik Award and the Nagurski Trophy as the nation's top defensive player in 2015, while Tulsa linebacker Zaven Collins repeated that feat in 2020. Houston's Ed Oliver won the 2017 Outland Trophy as the nation's best interior lineman, while Cincinnati's Coby Bryant won the 2021 Jim Thorpe Award as the top defensive back. The American has had four top-10 Heisman Trophy finishes as Navy quarterback Keenan Reynolds was fifth in 2015, UCF quarterback McKenzie Milton was eighth in 2017 and sixth in 2018, and Cincinnati quarterback Desmond Ridder was eighth in 2021. Reynolds was also selected as the winner of the 2016 AAU James E. Sullivan Award as the nation's top amateur athlete.

Additionally, SMU's Avery Acker was chosen as the Division I women's volleyball Academic All-America of the Year in 2015, South Florida star Georgina Corrick was the Division I softball Academic All-America of the Year in 2022, while Tulsa cross country standout Kirk Smith was chosen as a Rhodes Scholar in the fall of 2016.

The American announced a lucrative and comprehensive media rights extension with ESPN in May of 2019, providing the conference with a stronger and more extensive presence on ESPN's primary television networks (ABC, ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU). Since the extension took effect in the 2020-21 academic year, a minimum of 40 regular-season football telecasts and 60 regular-season men's basketball games per season will appear on those primary networks. Nearly every conferencecontrolled game in all sports will appear either on an ESPN network or on ESPN+. The football championship game, all rounds of the men's basketball championship, and multiple rounds of the women's basketball championship, will be on linear ESPN television networks.

The first seven American Athletic Conference Football Championships were televised by ABC as part of Championship Saturday. Subsequent championship games will appear on either ABC or ESPN through the duration of the 12-year

American Athletic Conference teams have access to the pinnacle of college football's postseason structure. An American representative would be chosen for the College Football Playoff semifinals if it is among the top four teams in the CFP selection committee's final ranking. Otherwise, the league would place its champion in a New Year's Bowl if it is ranked higher than the champions of Conference USA, the Mid-American Conference, the Mountain West Conference and the Sun Belt Conference.

Additionally, The American holds primary or secondary partnerships with an expansive group of bowls for the new cycle, which began in 2020, ensuring multiple annual matchups against the nation's top conferences and providing desirable postseason destinations for member institutions.

Away from the competitive arena, The American has established itself as a leader in the area of student-athlete wellness, both through the adoption of NCAA autonomous legislation on matters including full cost of attendance and nutrition. The conference, in conjunction with its Student-Athlete Advisory Committee has also launched the Pow6rful Minds campaign to improve awareness and education on mental issues and recognize the scholarly achievements of the conference's student-athletes.

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

R. GERALD TURNER

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT



As president of SMU since 1995, R. Gerald Turner is leading an era of unprecedented progress. Under his leadership, the University continues to advance as an institution of national excellence and international renown. SMU's progress has included increases in average admission test scores, a near tripling of student applications, an increase in enrollment of underrepresented communities up to 33% and a quadrupling of the endowment.

Building on a history of excellence, SMU Ignited: Boldly Shaping Tomorrow, which launched publicly in September 2021, is the third comprehensive fundraising campaign initiated under President Turner's leadership. The multiyear \$1.5 billion campaign for impact aims to build on SMU's strengths and empower outstanding students, enrich teaching and research, and enhance campus and community. SMU Ignited concluded the first year of its public phase with more than \$880 million raised.

During the planning and public phases of the campaign, SMU has secured the largest gifts in its history, including a landmark gift of \$100 million from the Moody Foundation to cre-

ate the new Moody School of Graduate and Advanced Studies, SMU's eighth degree-granting school; the first \$50 million gift from an alumni family, from Carolyn L. and David B. Miller '72, '73 for the Cox School of Business; the largest gift in SMU Athletics history, a \$50 million commitment from the Garry Weber Foundation toward the Garry Weber End Zone Complex at Gerald J. Ford Stadium; and the largest gift in University history by a non-alumnus from William S. Spears to establish the William S. Spears Institute for Entrepreneurial Leadership in the Cox School of Business.

Fueled by these investments, the University continues to advance as a leading center of teaching and research that accelerates knowledge, addresses significant issues, prepares students to be world changers and broadens community engagement. SMU ranks in the top 20% of the best national universities by U.S. News & World Report.

From its home in the global city of Dallas, SMU's vibrant campus offers enrichment opportunities such as the Tate Lecture Series and the Meadows Museum to students and the wider community. President Turner led efforts with the Board of Trustees to attract the George W. Bush Presidential Center, which opened at SMU in 2013. SMU and the Bush Presidential Center partner through fellowships, public lectures, the new George W. Bush Institute-SMU Economic Growth Initiative and additional collaborations that bring together students, faculty and global experts to tackle pressing challenges.

Beyond the campus, President Turner has been a leader in NCAA Athletics. He has chaired four Division I conferences, including the AAC. He has also served on the boards of the Dallas Citizens Council, the American Council on Education and the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, and he co-chaired the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics for nearly 10 years. In Texas, he serves on the Dallas Regional Chamber of Commerce and is a member of its University CEO Council. He also serves on the boards of the Methodist Health System Foundation, the Salvation Army of North Texas and the AT&T Performing Arts Center.

Before joining SMU, President Turner was the chancellor of the University of Mississippi. He previously served in administrative positions at the University of Oklahoma and Pepperdine University. A native of New Boston, Texas, he earned an A.A. degree from Lubbock Christian University, a B.S. in psychology from Abilene Christian University and an M.A. and a Ph.D. in psychology from the University of Texas at Austin. He and his wife, Gail, have two married daughters and five grandchildren.

RICK HART DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Rick Hart was named SMU's Director of Athletics on July 16, 2012.

During Hart's decade on the Hilltop, SMU has repeatedly shown its commitment to competing at the top level of college athletics and to providing a best-in-class student-athlete experience.

During the last three years alone, SMU has invested over \$125 million in football con-

struction projects, pushing the total invested in SMU Athletics facilities to a quarter of a billion dollars since 2013.

SMU has also reinforced its long-standing commitment to studentathlete development, wellbeing and experience by expanding its health, safety and well-being initiatives and staffing, its personal and professional development programs and degree completion opportunities.

SMU has added training staff and mental health professionals to address the physical, emotional and mental demands associated with being a student-athlete, and in fall 2022, SMU Athletics expanded its successful Life After Ball (LAB) Program to all sports. SMU has also added a BOLD (Big Opportunities Live in Dallas) Program to its suite of student-athlete development tools, with the goal of helping student-athletes navigate and capitalize on NIL legislation.

These programs are all in addition to the full cost-of-attendance scholarships SMU provides for its student-athletes. All told, SMU invests almost \$150,000 in each of its almost 500 student-athletes each year. These offerings have proven fruitful, as SMU student-athletes excel in the classroom, with 67% earning cumulative GPAs of 3.0 or higher, over one-third boasting GPAs of 3.5 or better and 91% earning degrees. During Hart's decade at SMU, over 1,400 degrees have been conferred on Mustang student-athletes.

SMU has also experienced broad success athletically over the past 10 years, winning 30 team conference titles across 13 sports and advancing 16 of 17 Mustang sports to the post-season.

In the community, SMU's partnership with the City of Dallas has been strengthened through community service and the Dallas, 214, "Born and Raised" and Triple-D marketing and branding initiatives.

Due to the generosity of alumni and friends, annual giving has reached record levels in support of operations, projects and facilities. In the past 10 years, SMU Athletics has been the beneficiary of an astounding 47 seven-figure gifts and 381 gifts of \$100k or more, and for the 2022 fiscal year, SMU Athletics raised an all-time record \$73 million. Because of the high level of support, SMU has renovated and expanded Moody Coliseum and opened numerous new facilities including the SMU Indoor Performance Center and Armstrong Fieldhouse, the Miller Event Center, the Styslinger/Altec SMU Tennis Complex, the Robson & Lindley Aquatics Center and BarrMcMillion Natatorium, the Payne Stewart SMU Golf Training Center at Trinity Forest Golf Club and Washburne Soccer & Track Stadium. Construction will begin soon on an outdoor pool to complete the Robson & Lindley Aquatics Center and Barr-McMillion Natatorium Complex and design is underway for the \$100M Garry Weber End Zone Complex.

Hart also developed and installed the Strategic Plan for SMU Athletics titled, "The SMU Advantage." The SMU Advantage consists of a departmental vision, mission, values and goals and operates on a principle of S.P.I.R.I.T. (Service, Passion, Integrity, Respect, Innovation and Teamwork), with a focus on the student-athlete and aligning the Athletics Department with the educational mission of the University.

Hart is serving as NACDA President for the 2022-23 membership year and is also a member of the LEAD1 Association Board of Directors. He has previously served on the NACDA Executive Committee, the NCAA Division I Championship/Sports Management Cabinet, the FCS Athletics Directors Association Executive Committee and as a faculty member for the D1-A Athletics Directors' Institute.

Hart came to SMU after six years as Director of Athletics at Tennessee at Chattanooga. Hart served seven years at Oklahoma in various athletics administrative capacities, ending as the Senior Associate Athletics Director in 2006. Hart has also worked in athletics at North Carolina and East Carolina and has served with the U.S. Olympic Committee.

A graduate of UNC, Hart earned a bachelor's degree in physical education, health and sport science. Hart and his wife, Allison, also a graduate of North Carolina, are proud parents of Trevor (SMU '22), an Assistant Director of Marketing at Northwestern, and Caroline (Carly), an SMU sophomore.

A third-generation athletics administrator, Hart's father, Dave, served as Director of Athletics at Tennessee, Florida State and East Carolina, and his late grandfather, Dave Sr., served in a variety of roles within collegiate athletics.



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RHETT LASHLEE

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH



Rhett Lashlee returned to SMU as Head Football Coach on Nov. 29, 2021. Lashlee previously served as offensive coordinator for the Mustangs for two seasons, including the recordsetting 2019 campaign.

Lashlee, a one-time finalist (2013) and two-time semifinalist (2019, 2020) for the Broyles Award, presented to the nation's top assistant coach, came back to the Hilltop after two seasons as the Miami Hurricanes' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Lashlee

also has the distinction of being the only coach ever nominated for the Broyles Award four different times at four different schools (Arkansas State, Auburn, SMU, Miami).

In his first season in Coral Gables, the Hurricanes jumped to No. 32 in the FBS in total offense (from No. 98), No. 29 in passing offense (from No. 52), No. 26 in scoring offense (from No. 90), No. 17 in red zone offense (from No. 122) and No. 20 in first downs gained (from No. 84). In 2021, Miami again ranked 26th in scoring average, improving to 34.1 PPG, and jumped up to 22nd in total offense at 448.8 yards per game.

Under his watch, QB D'Eriq King was a semifinalist for the Maxwell Award, Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award and Davey O'Brien Award. Several offensive players enjoyed career years under his tutelage, including Michael Harley, who became the school's all-time leading wide receiver, and TE Brevin Jordan, who was a Mackey Award semifinalist and an eventual 2021 NFL Draft pick of the Houston Texans. In 2021, freshman Tyler Van Dyke was named the ACC Rookie of the Year, and Charleston Rambo broke the Miami single-season receiving yards and receptions record.

Prior to heading to Coral Gables, Lashlee helped lead the Mustangs to a 10-3 finish in 2019, guiding an offense that ranked No. 7 in FBS in scoring (41.8 points per game), No. 13 in passing offense (309 yards per game), No. 9 in total offense (489.8 yards per game) and No. 12 in first downs gained (322). SMU's 10 wins were the school's most since the 1984 season, and its 35 rushing touchdowns set a school record.

The Mustangs were ranked No. 3 nationally in plays per game, averaging 80.9 – a testament to Lashlee's up-tempo offensive style. SMU was one of only 34 teams in FBS to average more than six yards per play in 2019. Quarterback Shane Buechele threw for 3,929 yards with 34 touchdowns and just 10 interceptions, completing 63 percent of his passes. Running back Xavier Jones rushed for 1,276 yards and 23 touchdowns, averaging 5.2 yards per carry. His 23 TDs led the nation. James Proche led the nation with 111 catches. All three were first-team All-AAC selections.

In his first season at SMU, the Mustang offense ranked 27th nationally in passing offense at 271.7 yards per game. Quarterback Ben Hicks registered 2,582 yards and 19 touchdowns to finish his SMU career as the all-time leader in passing yards (9,081), total offense (8,977), TD passes (71), TDs responsible for (74), completions (718) and 300-yard games (12). His season passing yards ranked 11th at SMU, while his 19 touchdowns tied him for eighth. Wide receiver Proche was named a first-team All-AAC selection, and finished the season ranked fifth nationally in receptions per game (7.8), seventh in receiving touchdowns (12) and ninth in receiving yards (1,199).

Prior to joining SMU's staff, Lashlee served as an offensive coordinator for seven seasons, spending 2017 at UConn, 2013-16 at Auburn, 2012 at Arkansas State and 2011 at Samford.

Prior to UConn, Lashlee helped Auburn to the 2013 SEC Championship, a BCS Championship berth and the 2016 Sugar Bowl, managing one of the more prolific offenses in college football during his tenure.

Lashlee was the offensive coordinator at Arkansas State (2012), helping the Red Wolves to a Sun Belt Championship, and at Samford (2011), after having served as a graduate assistant at Auburn (2009-10) and Arkansas (2006). While at Auburn as an offensive graduate assistant during the 2009-10 seasons, Lashlee helped the Tigers finish 14-0 in 2010, winning the SEC title and the BCS National Championship. Lashlee coached at Springdale (Ark.) High School in 2004-05.

Lashlee graduated from Arkansas in 2006 with a degree in marketing and business administration. He received his master's degree in higher education from Auburn in 2009.

He is married to the former Lauren Lee. They have twin sons, Thomas and Hudson, and twin daughters, Rowyn and Scarlet.




SEASON IN REVIEW



Head Coach Rhett Lashlee

SMU finished the 2022 regular season, the first under Head Coach Rhett Lashlee, 7-5 to become bowl eligible for the fourth straight season. The streak is the longest since SMU went to four bowls from 2009-12 and made the Mustangs bowl eligible in five of the past six seasons and nine of the past 14. The Mustangs used a three-game win streak with victories over Tulsa, Houston and USF to secure bowl eligibility.

SMU has won at least seven games each season dating back to 2019, making it the longest stretch with at least seven wins since the 2009-12 seasons. It is also the first season the Mustangs have won five conference games since going 6-2 in league play in 2019. The Mustangs have 32 wins, the most for a Power 6 team in Texas over the past four seasons.

Rice finished the regular season as the FBS leader in receiving yards (1,355) and receiving yards per game (112.9), while ranking fifth in receiving per game (8.0) and 11th in receiving TDs (10). His 1,355 yards sent the SMU single-season record. Mordecai, SMU's record holder for 300-yard games at 13, ranked in the top 10 nationally for passing TDs (31), passing yards per game (300.5) and points responsible for game (18.0).


As a team, SMU finished the regular season in the top 15 among FBS rankings for passing offense (5th, 324.9), scoring offense (11th, 38.4), total offense (12th, 279.8), first down offense (12th, 302), red zone offense (13th, .914), blocked kicks (8th, 4) and fewest penalties per game (10th, 4.42).

SMU had a record-setting day in the 77-63 win over Houston on Nov. 5. The Mustangs set the SMU record and tied the AAC record for points in a game and points in the first half (56). Mordecai set both the program and conference record for TD passes (9) and TDs responsible for (10), while also tying the NCAA record with seven passing TDs in the first

half. Collin Rogers tied the AAC record and set the program record with 11 PATs, en route to a single-season record of 56 (56-56) for the Mustangs at the end of the regular season. SMU capped of the regular season with a 34-31 win over Memphis at home, bringing the Mustangs' record at Ford Stadium to 18-4 since the start of 2019.

Four Mustangs were honored as All-American Athletic Conference selections, including Rice who earned first-team honors. Elijah Chatman and Justin Osborne were named to the league's second team, while Jaylon Thomas was an honorable mention selection.

In SMU single-season rankings, the 2022 season ranks in the top three for scoring average (T3rd, 38.4), scoring (T3rd, 461), passing yards (3rd, 3,899) and passing yards per game (3rd, 324.9).

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

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KEVIN J WORTHEN BYU PRESIDENT



In describing Kevin J Worthen, 13th president of Brigham Young University, friends and colleagues use a variety of descriptors, some of them seemingly contradictory: brilliant yet unassuming, physically towering yet down-to-earth, visionary yet deferential. But when asked to introduce himself at the press conference following the March 2014 announce-

ment of his new position, Worthen kept it simple: "I'm a BYU guy through and through."

It's an apt summation, as this institution has framed much of Worthen's life. From an early-childhood fascination with the university to degrees in political science and law to years as a professor and administrator, Worthen has been inspired by the mission and ideals of Brigham Young University.

Born April 15, 1956, in tiny Dragerton, Utah, Worthen was the last of four children. Friends and family remember Worthen as a precocious child—an early reader who thrived in school and was involved in just about every opportunity offered him. But more than anything, his teen years were defined by sports—especially basketball, a sport that saw him become an all-state center as a high school senior and later a captain for the College of Eastern Utah (CEU) Eagles.

Worthen has been an avid fan of Cougar sports since his childhood. At age 10, he attended his first basketball game in the Smith Fieldhouse, cheering on a squad that would win the National Invitational Tournament. Half a century later, his feelings haven't changed much. With just a couple of exceptions, his family has made an annual pilgrimage to BYU's conference basketball tournament since 1993.

After serving a mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to Monterrey, Mexico, Worthen dated

Peggy Sealey while finishing an associate degree at CEU. The two were married in 1978 soon after Worthen transferred to BYU for his bachelor's degree. They now have three children and five grandchildren.

Graduating summa cum laude with both his bachelor's and juris doctor degrees, Worthen left BYU in 1982 to clerk for Judge Malcolm R. Wilkey of the D.C. Circuit Court and then for Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court. In 1984, Worthen joined the respected law firm Jennings Strouss & Salmon in Arizona, but his promising law-firm career proved to be short lived. In 1987, BYU came calling with an opportunity to return to the J. Reuben Clark Law School as a faculty member and Worthen jumped at the chance.

The Hugh W. Colton Professor of Law, Worthen specializes in federal Indian law and the rights of indigenous peoples. He spent a year as a Fulbright Scholar studying the cultural and ethnic assimilation of Chile's native populations.

From 2004 to 2008, he served as dean of the Law School before being named BYU's advancement vice president, in which role he oversaw such areas as athletics, BYU Broadcasting, LDS Philanthropies, alumni, and communications. In this role, he was involved in several significant developments in athletics, including going independent in football, joining the West Coast Conference, and negotiating television contracts with ESPN. This past year, Worthen was integral in BYU's admittance into the Big 12 Conference.

In his tenure as dean and vice president, and now as BYU president, Worthen has turned again and again to the mission of BYU, finding inspiration and motivating vision in the charge "to assist individuals in their quest for perfection and eternal life."

"There is a divine destiny at this school," Worthen declared in an April 2014 address, "and it [plays] out largely in the lives of our graduates and the influence that they have. ... To be part of an organization that has that kind of impact—an eternal impact on people's lives—it's a tremendous experience."



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TOM HOLMOE **DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS**



Tom Holmoe was named Director of Athletics at Brigham Young University on March 1, 2005. He oversees a nationally recognized program with 21 intercollegiate sports, involving more than 600 student-athletes and a 190-person staff. Since his appointment, BYU has captured 128 conference regular-season and

postseason championships, and more than 290 studentathletes have earned All-America status.

Holmoe was named the 2021 Athletics Director of the Year by the National Association of College Directors of Athletics. The ADOY Award highlights the efforts of athletics directors for their commitment and positive contributions to student-athletes, campuses and their surrounding communities. Holmoe was named one of four recipients at the FBS level, along with Matt Hogue (Coastal Carolina), Shane Lyons (West Virginia) and Rob Mullens (Oregon).

Under his leadership, Holmoe helped guide BYU to admittance into the Big 12 Conference. The Cougars will officially join the Big 12 on July 1, 2023. The Cougars compete in 21 sports, and the Big 12 sponsors every sport the Cougars compete in except men's volleyball. BYU's men's sports include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis, volleyball. Its women's sports are basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, softball, soccer, swimming & diving, tennis, and volleyball. The Cougars will participate in every sport sponsored by the Big 12 except equestrian, rowing, and wrestling.

In addition to his role as director of athletics, Holmoe served as a member of the NCAA Men's Basketball Committee from 2015-18 and was the Executive Council Committee Chair for the West Coast Conference from 2014-17. Over his 17-year tenure, BYU has an average ranking of 36th in the annual NACDA Learfield Directors' Cup, ranking all athletic programs in the country. For the 2020-21 athletic season, BYU finished No. 17 in the Directors' Cup standings. In the fall of 2022, for the first time ever, BYU finished No. 1 in the Directors' Cup standings for fall sports.

A former Cougar defensive back from 1978-82, Holmoe returned to BYU in July 2001 as Associate Athletics Director for Development. As part of his responsibilities, he supervised the Cougar Club, served as the department's liaison with the LDS Foundation, served on the BYU Alumni Association Board of Directors and worked on the capital campaign to raise funds for the university's new athletic facilities.

A native of La Crescenta, Calif., Holmoe first came to BYU on a football scholarship in 1978. He earned first-team All-WAC honors as a senior in 1982 and was selected in the fourth round of the 1983 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. Over a seven-year NFL career, he played on three Super Bowl championship teams with the 49ers in 1984, 1988 and 1989.

After retiring from professional football, Holmoe returned to BYU to serve as a graduate assistant under LaVell Edwards from 1990-91 and later accepted an offer from Hall of Fame coach Bill Walsh to become the Stanford secondary coach in 1992, where he remained for two seasons. In 1994, he returned to the 49ers as defensive backfield coach for two seasons, where he earned a fourth Super Bowl ring. Two years later Holmoe joined the University of California staff as defensive coordinator and later became the head coach from 1997-2001.

Holmoe graduated from BYU with a degree in Zoology in 1983 and received a master's degree from BYU in Athletic Administration in 1995. He and his wife, Lori, have four children and nine grandchildren.





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KALANI SITAKE **HEAD FOOTBALL COACH**



Kalani Sitake (pronounced kah-lah-nee seetah-kay) is in his seventh season overseeing BYU football program.

In his 22nd overall season as a coach in 2022, Sitake leads the program he once played for under Hall of Fame coach LaVell Edwards. A former Cougar running back (1994, 1997-2000), Sitake is the 14th head coach in BYU history and just the fourth since 1972, when Edwards took over the program. Sitake is the

first former player under Edwards to be named head coach at BYU.

With a career record of 55-34, including back-to-back 10win seasons in 2020 and 2021 and a 7-5 record in 2022, Sitake and his program will join the Big 12 conference in 2023. This year's New Mexico Bowl will be the 14th bowl game in which Sitake has coached during his career. In the prior 13 bowl games, he has been on the winning side 10 times, including a 3-2 mark as a head coach.

During his tenure, Sitake has helped the Cougars achieve notable wins over Baylor, Wisconsin, Michigan State, Mississippi State, Tennessee, USC, Utah, Arizona, Arizona State, Washington State and Boise State, among others. He has also championed BYU's Built4Life career development and NIL program. Built4Life is designed to support BYU studentathletes in developing critical life skills, facilitating professional development opportunities and connecting classroom learning directly to relevant employment opportunities.

Named BYU's head coach on December 19, 2015, Sitake returned to his alma mater from Oregon State, where he served as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator in 2015 under head coach Gary Andersen. Sitake took the helm at BYU after 15 years in the college coaching profession, which included seven seasons serving as a defensive coordinator and four years as an assistant head coach.

Prior to Oregon State, Sitake spent 10 seasons at the University of Utah under head coach Kyle Whittingham, also a former Cougar. Sitake started at Utah in 2005 as the linebackers coach and was promoted to defensive coordinator in 2009 before also being named assistant head coach in 2012. While at Utah, Sitake coached several Pac-12 and Mountain West Conference honorees, including Morris Trophy winners Star Lotulelei (2011) and Nate Orchard (2014).

During his career, Sitake has helped mentor 29 NFL Draft picks, including nine Cougars since taking over the program in 2016. Last year's starting running back Tyler Allgeier is making a difference as rookie in Atlanta, following the footsteps of recent Cougar draft picks such as No. 2 overall pick Zach Wilson and offensive tackle Brady Christensen among five players drafted in the 2021, linebackers Sione Takitaki and Fred Warner in 2019 and 2018 and running back Jamaal Williams in 2017. Among their many accomplishments, Williams, BYU's all-time rushing leader, paces the NFL in touchdowns in 2022 and Warner is widely regarded the top linebacker in the NFL.

Sitake began his coaching career in 2001 as the defensive backs and special teams coach at Eastern Arizona before becoming a defensive graduate assistant at BYU in 2002 under Gary Crowton. Sitake then joined the staff at Southern Utah where he coached running backs, tight ends and offensive line during the 2003 and 2004 seasons.

He began his BYU playing career in 1994 prior to serving a two-year mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints to Oakland, California. After returning and redshirting in 1997, Sitake was a three-year starter at fullback for the Cougars from 1998-2000 under Edwards. A team captain as a senior, Sitake's last game as a player was also the last game coached by the legendary Edwards, who was a great mentor for Sitake.

Born in Nuku'alofa, Tonga, and raised in Laie, Hawai'i and Provo, Utah, Sitake is the nation's first FBS head football coach of Tongan descent. He graduated from BYU in 2000 with a bachelor's degree in English. Sitake and his wife Timberly have four children.



SEASON IN REVIEW



Cougar defensive lineman celebrates as BYU gets a stop against Baylor on Sept. 10 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. BYU's defense got the final say in a 26-20 double-overtime victory ending in a defensive stand.

BYU finished off a 2022 regular season 7-5, earning a bowl bid for the 17th time in 18 seasons.

The Cougars picked up Power 5 wins over Baylor and Stanford and a victory over regional rivals Boise State and Utah State while playing a strong overall schedule. Including its upcoming matchup with SMU, 10 of BYU's 12 FBS opponents in 2022 earned bowl bids—the most ever in the independence era.

BYU also earned a winning season for the 43rd time since LaVell Edwards became head coach of the program in 1972. Only nine programs—Ohio State, Oklahoma, Alabama, Michigan, Penn State, Georgia, USC, Florida and Boise State—have had more winning seasons in that timeframe. Prior to 1972, BYU had won just 173 games in 47 seasons. Since Edwards' takeover, BYU has won 437 games, which ranks No. 8 nationally.

BYU's offense ranks No. 32 nationally at 440.7 yards per

game and averaged 31.9 points per game. The Cougars are led by one of college football's best passers in Jaren Hall, ranking No. 12 in pass efficiency rating at 160.83, totaling 3,171 passing yards and 31 passing touchdowns with only six interceptions. Hall also boasts three rushing touchdowns and one score as a receiver in 2022. He is just the third BYU quarterback (Steve Young, Brandon Doman) to throw for 3,000 yards and rush for 300 yards in the same season.

One of Hall's favorite targets is wide receiver Puka Nacua, who leads the team with 10 total touchdowns (5 rushing, 5 receiving) and has 48 receptions and 625 yards while rushing the ball 25 times for 209 yards in just nine games.

Wide receiver Keanu Hill has also been one of the most reliable options in the passing games, posting 36 receptions, 572 yards and a team-leading seven touchdowns. Outside of Nacua and Hill, BYU has four other receivers with at least 20 receptions on the season.

The running game features Christopher Brooks with a teamleading 729 rushing yards and five touchdowns while Hall, a dual-threat, is second on the team with 350 rushing yards.

BYU began the year with a dominant win over South Florida in Tampa, dropping the Bulls 50-21 in the season opener. The win sparked a top-25 matchup against Baylor in Provo the following week.

The Cougars and Bears put together one of the top games of the year, a slugfest going to double-overtime before BYU outlasted Baylor with a defensive stand to earn the win, 26-20.

BYU fell to nationally ranked Oregon at Autzen Stadium but responded with back-to-back wins over Wyoming and in-state foe Utah State the following weeks.

In a unique matchup in Las Vegas, the Cougars came up short to Notre Dame in annual Shamrock Series for the Irish. BYU's comeback effort ended in 28-20 defeat at Allegiant Stadium.

Injuries started to pile up for the Cougars over the next few weeks and BYU suffered three more consecutive defeats to Arkansas, Liberty and East Carolina, all bowl teams with two of the three running some of the most potent offenses in the country.

Trying to snap a four-game losing streak, a daunting task on the blue turf was just what the Cougars needed. BYU put together one of its most complete games of the year, beating Boise State 31-28 in Boise.

The game against the Broncos was back and forth and BYU's biggest stars showed up with 377 passing yards and four total touchdowns from Hall while Nacua had 14 receptions, 157 yards and two touchdowns, including the game-winner, a toe-tapping acrobatic grab on fourth down in the corner of the end zone with 1:46 to go. The Cougar defense held, and BYU came away with another signature win to get back on track.

The win was the spark to finish the regular season with three-straight victories, including a road win over Stanford to close the year and setup BYU's matchup with the SMU Mustangs in the 2022 New Mexico Bowl. This year's bowl game will be the second time the Cougars and Mustangs have met in a bowl matchup. The first contest between the two schools took place at the 1980 Holiday Bowl, when BYU completed one of the greatest comebacks in college football history by scoring 21 points over the final 2:33 of the game to beat the Mustangs 46-45.

The San Jose State Spartans defeated the New Mexico Lobos, 20-12, which highlighted a season that saw more SJSU wins than any of in the three previous.

Fresno State (10-3) won the bowl game for the first time in three tries. Jake Haener was 26 of 41 for 286 yards and a touchdown. His status had been in doubt when he briefly entered the transfer portal after coach Kalen DeBoer took the job at Washington. The Miners (7-6) pulled to 26-24 early in the fourth quarter on Calvin Brownholtz's 51-vard touchdown pass to Trent Thompson.Fresno State got a field goal, followed by a UTEP safety, before the Bulldogs ran out the clock. UTEP's Gavin Hardison threw for 252 yards and a touchdown. UTEP has lost the New Mexico Bowl in all three of its appearances and has a seven-game bowl losing streak dating to 1967.



The New Mexico Bowl trophy is one of the most unique in all of college sports. It is a Native American clay pot meticulously handcrafted by artists Marcellus and Elizabeth Media from the Zia Pueblo. The 20-inch bowl-shaped pottery features the iconic Zia sun symbol and images of football players, a deer, mountain lion, buffalo and eagle.

Elizabeth hand-coils and fires the pottery at the couple's home studio and her husband, Marcellus, paints the clay trophies. Using a white base coat on the pot makes the Zia patterns stand out after being hand-painted in black. His final touch is colored acrylic paints depicting football players in classic game stances and logos for the participating teams, not to mention the New Mexico Bowl insignia.

The New Mexico Bowl stuck with the unconventional for its Outstanding Offensive and Defensive Player Awards. They went to another Zia Pueblo artist, Ralph Aragon, who crafted the trophies from traditional leather shields.

Jeff Siembieda, New Mexico Bowl Executive Director, found all three artists in 2006 when he traveled to the pueblo, located approximately 30 miles northwest of Albuquerque, looking for permission to use the Zia sun in its logo. The tribal leaders gave there consent and in return, asked that Zia art be used for the awards.

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

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
